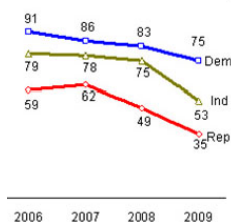
And Now More Than Ever . . .

In mid-December, I attended a presentation on Global Warming by the Alliance for Climate Education ([ACE](#)) at a high-school in Newton. The speaker asked who knew what global warming was; out of 200 students, fewer than 10% raised their hand.

On October 22, the Pew Research Group released a report headlined "**There has been a sharp decline over the past year in the percentage of Americans who say there is solid evidence that global temperatures are rising**". In just one year, the percent of Americans who believe in global warming has *dropped* by 14%.

Ironically, this study appeared only days before the International Day of Climate Action, a world-wide demonstration for turning back our greenhouse gas levels to a sustainable level -- successful internationally, but . . .

There are many organizations working on various aspects of this issue: Policy, Research, Action. And we must support each other to amplify our individual efforts.
